Term	Definition
embark	To go onto a ship ready to leave port
disembark	Leave a ship
арех	Peak or top (like the King of Britain)
British Empire	Countries that Great Britain once controlled. Now come together for meetings and the Commonwealth Games
Ascanius (A11)	A transport ship used to take troops to war during World War I
Medic (A7)	A transport ship used to take troops to war during World War I
HMAT	His Majesty's Australian Transport (identified transport ships such as <i>Medic</i> )
Kaiser	The title given to the King of Germany
Blackboy Hill camp	A training camp in the Perth hills for men who joined the Army in World War I
AIF	Australian Imperial Forces
recruitment	Enrolment of men into the army, navy or air force
11th Battalion	A group of infantry soldiers during World War I - many were from WA
dungarees	Pants worn at the time of the war
ANZACs	Australian and New Zealand Army Corps- famous because of their bravery fighting at Gallipoli and in France (on the Western Front) during World War I
camouflage	Cover-up or to hide
Triple Entente	Britain, France and Russia (joined by their colonies and Serbia, Belgium and Japan when the war started)
Central Powers	Enemy countries of Great Britain. The main countries were Germany, Austria Hungary and Turkey
AIF	Australian Imperial Forces - Australian servicemen in World War I

Using cardboard rectangles with the historical term and definition written on separate pieces, or enlarging this table and cutting out the terms and definitions, students (in groups) could be instructed to match the terms with the definition. They would then pin the term together with the correct definition onto a World War One Word Wall. New words discovered by students can then be added to this set of terms.
